
One-Button and the Sea




Grandpa and One-Button spend many days and nights on their boat, waiting for the land to call and say it is safe to return. Can you design and build your own model boat?

Don't forget to write a list of all the things you will need to include!









The water is wonderfully exciting, but it's very important that we learn how to stay safe next to the water. Think about:


- The importance of staying away from the edge of water

Design and make your own boat


What will your boat look like? Make sure you label your design.



What materials will you need?

Make your own paper aeroplane

- 1. Use a piece of A4 paper and fold it in half lengthways.
- 2. Unfold and then fold the top two corners into the centre line.
- 3. Turn the piece of paper over and fold it in half again lengthways.
- 4. Finally, fold the sloping edge down to meet the bottom of the body. Now, fold the new sloping edge down to meet the bottom. Turn over and repeat on the other side.
- 5. Use a piece of tape to keep the wings together.
